

A PATH TO PREVENTION:

State Profile: Arkansas

HPV vaccination is recommended for routine vaccination at age 11 or 12 years and may be started at age 9. Adults age 27 to 45 should talk to their doctors to see if HPV vaccination is recommended for them.

HPV VACCINATION RATES FOR 13-17 YEAR-OLDS AS OF 2022:

Arkansas has increased HPV vaccination coverage of **al dose** by 20% and up-to-date (UTD) by 21% since 2016. However, coverage remains lower than the U.S. average and below the Healthy People 2030 goal of 80% UTD. Compared to meningitis and whooping cough (Tdap) vaccines routinely recommended for adolescents, HPV vaccination coverage lags. Arkansas vaccination rates amog 13-17 year olds were 95% for meningitis vaccine and 94% for Tdap vaccine in 2022.

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HPV vaccination protects against more than 90% of HPV cancers.



NATIONAL AVERAGE COMPLETION RATE:









Elimination

Develop and disseminate a plan for HPV cancer

elimination in the Southeast, beginning with

cervical cancer as a public health problem



Communication

Develop and implement a **communication campaign and messages** for the Southeastern region

- 1. Create a campaign that will focus on HPV vaccination as cancer prevention for everyone (gender-neutral)
- 2. Focus on working with rural communities through health department partnerships
- 3. Provide bite sized, digestible, accessible information for health care providers
- 1. Develop a regional plan for eliminating HPV cancers, starting with cervical cancer as a public health problem
- 2. Identify and unify partners in a collective voice around a plan to eliminate HPV cancers, starting with cervical cancer
- 3. Build a toolkit for Southeast Roundtable states and jurisdictions to develop own elimination plans

Start at Age 9

Accelerate efforts to start HPV vaccination at age 9

- Develop and disseminate targeted messaging to our key partners to drive better knowledge about starting HPV vaccination at age 9 and drive demand for vaccination
- 2. Provide tailored information to health care provider teams about HPV vaccination beginning at age 9
- 3. Engage regional partners to initiate activation of HPV vaccination beginning at age 9





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Defining Cervical Cancer Elimination

- Elimination is not
 - A case count of 0 or the complete absence of disease.
- Elimination is
 - A strategy and associated policies and actions that aim to reduce the burden of HPV cancers by reducing the number of people affected.
- Cervical cancer elimination is defined by the World Health Organization as an incidence rate of less than 4 cases of cervical cancer per 100,000 women.



Epidemiology - Cervical Cancer in Alabama

- ▶ 5th in incidence and 4th highest mortality in the nation (CDC, 2016-2020)
- African Americans have higher incidence and mortality than national rates
- ▶ HPV vaccination lower than the nation (54% compared to 47%)
- Barriers to screening:
 - Limited knowledge on the connection between HPV and cervical cancer
 - ► Lack of awareness that cervical cancer can be prevented
 - Lack of perceived risk
 - Fear of results
 - Competing priorities
 - Not knowing where to go
 - Lack of awareness of no-cost screening at the local department
 - Concerns about lack of confidentiality (small towns)





HPV Vaccination

Leadership Academy for High School Students in Chambers County

- Funded by the National Cancer Institute
- Development, implementation and evaluation of a multi-channel communication campaign to promote HPV vaccination
- Engagement of the entire school system
- Community awareness
- Provision of HPV vaccination in the schools

Outcomes:

- HPV vaccination uptake at the county level compared to previous year (primary)
- HPV vaccination uptake at the school level compared to previous year when HPV vaccination was provided at school without the "communication campaign" (secondary)



Cervical Cancer Screening & Follow Up

Alabama Department of Public Health and Colposcopies

- Nurse Practitioners Certified for colposcopy
- NPs supported by Medical Officer for Family Health Services
- One Nurse Practitioner per 6 Districts
- Travel to health departments within Districts to provide colposcopy statewide
- 823+ performed this FY (Last FY 253)
- ► 72% show rate for colposcopy
- 24% high grade result on colposcopy visits

Priorities Going Forward

Health Promotion & Outreach

- Grassroots, communityled engagement
- Move beyond academic centers and comprehensive cancer centers to engage more non-profits, civic, faithbased and business leaders
- Ensure evidence-based approaches, collaboration and learning among all partners

HPV Vaccination

- School-based HPV education vaccination campaigns
- Provision of HPV vaccination at pharmacies without standing orders

Cervical Cancer Screening

- Simplify U.S. cervical cancer screening guidelines
- Regulatory approval by FDA for vaginal self-sampling
- Create CPT (reimbursement) codes for HPV testing

Follow Up & Treatment

- Fund training for mobile colposcopy units and LEEP/colposcopy training for nurse practitioners
- Increasing access to services in rural, underserved communities is critical



Cross-Cutting Engagement, Documentation, Evaluation through Operation Wipe Out

WE NEED EVERYONE!

If you are a father/mother/grandfather/grandmother/guardian - Vaccinate your children/grandchildren and lead by example.

If you are an **adult** - get screened and follow-up and lead by example by motivating your family members, neighbors, church members OR motivate people with a cervix to get screened.

If you are a pastor or a leader in community organization/crochet club, etc. - talk about cervical cancer, ways to prevent it and provide resources (e.g., where to go).

If you are a **business leader or supervisor** - provide education among your employees and allow time off to get screened or get their children vaccinated.

If you are a health care provider (no matter your specialty or role) - talk about cervical cancer, educate, and facilitate access to HPV vaccination, screening, follow-up.

If you are a **community health advisor** - discuss with your county coordinator group activities you can organize to provide education and facilitate access to HPV vaccination, screening, follow-up.

If you do NOT fit in any of the categories - take it upon yourself to lead by example and get the word out!

Everyone can contribute, every community matters, and every country can eliminate cancer.
